New Ruling on Advanced Payment Program for Strawberry Growers

In the past, this program was of limited use to strawberry growers as they only had the loan for a couple of months before they had to repay. Horticulture Nova Scotia, administrator of this AFFC guaranteed loan program to strawberry growers, as well as all vegetable, raspberry, highbush blueberry and greenhouse vegetables, has been able to negotiate a change which will be beneficial to strawberry growers. Starting immediately, Horticulture NS can issue a loan when berry growers plant or renovate – when your input costs are highest. You will not have to repay until you harvest before September 30, 2012.

For instance, if you plant an acreage this year, you can receive a loan based on the anticipated yield from that planting. There is no repayment until you begin selling the product from that planting next year. AgriStabilty or Crop Insurance is required as collateral when you make the loan. Crop insurance is available on strawberries until November 14, 2011.

The purpose of this program is to provide a cash flow to allow for orderly marketing. Loans are based on the amount of crop you plant or have in storage. Loans of up to \$100,000 are interest free. Loans of more than \$100,000 and less than \$400,000 are at 1/4 of a per cent under prime.

There is an administration fee of one per cent to members and three per cent to non members of Horticulture Nova Scotia. There is no administration fee for potatoes. Repayment is as the product is sold.

Greenhouse Vegetable Growers are eligible for the Advanced Payment Program and Horticulture NS is administering the program for them. Administration fees for Vegetable Greenhouse Growers is 1.25 per cent.

Honey Bee Quarantine Update

A Review and Assessment for the Quarantine of Nova Scotia Honey Bees under the Bee Industry Act was conducted through the winter and spring of 2011. The recommendations from that study have been reviewed and the Minister of Agriculture, the Honourable John MacDonell, has announced that the Bee Quarantine Declaration will remain in place. The Nova Scotia border will remain closed to the importation of bees with exceptions of queens from designated countries and the movement (under permit) of bees to and from Prince Edward Island.

Upcoming Deadlines

The application deadline is fast approaching for Winter Grain - August 31!

The deadline for planting is September 30 in the Annapolis, Kings and Hants West counties and September 20 for all other areas.

The deadline to apply for Forage Establishment is October 31. Fields of legumes and legume-grass mixes seeded by July 1, as well as grass seeded by September 1 are eligible for coverage.

Cancelling Crop Insurance

Most Crop Insurance contracts are continuous – they do not terminate at the end of the cropping season (unless a producer requests cancellation in writing by the deadline date).

The benefit of this approach is that you as a client do not risk the chance of not being able to insure your crop for the entire season if for some reason you do not make an application by the required date. At the same time, if you do not cancel by the cancellation deadline, you will be expected to insure your crop during the current

crop year. Please note the following deadlines:

Cancellation Deadlines

Blueberry - December 15
Tree Insurance - November 14
Winter Grain - September 15
Tree Fruit - November 30
Strawberry - September 15

Problems with Harvest?

AgriInsurance clients who experience problems or delays at harvest are reminded of their obligation to advise the Commission promptly (within 5 days) with a Notice of Damage. You must provide the Commission with a Notice of Damage when:

- you think your crop will be reduced due to harvesting delays as a result of an insurable peril;
- you note a reduction in yield due to an insurable peril once you complete harvest. (Must be reported within 5 days of harvest); or
- your harvest could or extends past the end of the crop insurance crop year end date.

Failure to provide this reporting could result in the denial of any claim for losses to your crop. When in doubt report your concerns to the Commission office.

AgriInsurance Now Covers New Crops

The Commission recently amended several of its crop insurance plans to allow for coverage to be provided to new crops. These new crops include triticale, which has been added to the Winter Grain Plan and peaches which have been added to the Tree Fruit plan. Both crops are now available to be added to a client's coverage for the 2012 crop year. In addition to these new crops, clients growing sunflowers or Canola can also obtain crop insurance coverage for these oil seed crops under existing crop plans of the Commission.

Wind Now a New Peril for Dairy

The Nova Scotia Crop and Livestock Insurance Commission has amended the Dairy Livestock Insurance Plan to include wind as a peril for the purpose of the Loss of Income benefit. This was in response to a request made by DFNS. Farms with dairy insurance that are unable to produce milk will be eligible for the loss of income benefit if the loss is a result of excessive wind. Examples of this include losing a barn or milking parlour in a wind storm or hurricane and having no way to house or milk cows. Prior to the amendment, loss of income benefits could only be paid when losses occurred due to diseases specified in the insurance regulations, fire and collapse of a dairy building as a result of ice or snow.

Grass Pelletizing Demonstration Field Days

The NSDA is partnering with Bioenergy Inc, a local innovative energy company that's constructing mobile densification equipment for the production of pellets. The demonstrations will promote a renewable energy business opportunity for farmers by demonstrating pelletizing of grass.

There is considerable acreage of underutilized land in Nova Scotia that could be brought back into production, providing a new business opportunity for farmers in the form of dedicated energy crops.

Programs and Business Risk Management - Update

AgriInvest and AgriStability

These business risk management programs are designed to help producers protect their income and manage risks, such as drought, flooding, low prices, and increased input costs. AgriInvest provides farmers with flexible coverage for small income declines, as well as support for investments to mitigate risks or improve market income. Farmers deposit money into an AgriInvest account and receive matching government contributions. If you receive an AgriInvest deposit notice, you have 90 days to respond by making your deposit.

2010 AgriInvest Deposit Notices

Deposit notices are being mailed out with information on how to make your deposit and receive matching government contribution. Once you receive your deposit notice, follow the instructions included to make your deposit. The deadline to make the deposit is indicated on the Deposit Notice.

Producers can request a withdrawal from their AgriInvest account through their financial institution at any time throughout the year. For more information, contact the AgriInvest administration 1-866-367-8506 or visit the website at www.agr.gc.ca/AgriInvest.

AgriStability

This margin-based program provides support when a farmer experiences larger farm income losses. AgriStability covers declines of more than 15 per cent in a farmer's average income from previous years. If you participated in AgriStability 2010, you will automatically be enrolled for 2011 and receive a 2011 enrolment notice soon. If you have not received your 2011 enrollment notice and have not heard from AgriStability, call Steven at 1-866-844-4276 or 893-6374.

Homegrown Success Programs

This spring, the Programs and Business Risk Management office held promotion sessions to launch our new suite of programs under the Homegrown Success 10-year vision for the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture. Nova Scotia 4-H Leaders Volunteer 189 Years of Service

It is often said that it takes a community to raise a child – but more so, it is the special people in that community that provide guidance, understanding and knowledge to help young people grow and flourish. Four Nova Scotia 4-H leaders were recently honoured at the 2011 Canadian 4-H Council Conference and Annual Meeting for their remarkable tenure of community service and dedication as volunteers to the provincial 4-H program. Together, they have contributed 189 years of volunteer service as 4-H leaders. Those exceptional individuals are Polly Zwicker with the Lapland 4-H Club in Lunenburg, Anne Carter and Doug and Eva Landry with the Lakeside 4-H Club in St. Peter's.

Polly has been a 4-H leader for 48 years and works with her daughter Gail to ensure that the young people in their 4-H club learn the life skills they need before they step out into the world. Her six children have all gone through 4-H and she says the wholesomeness of 4-H makes it a great family program. She says "It teaches children to get along with each other, to have manners and be good sports." "I've seen a lot of changes since I started in 4-H, but the program always teaches the children skills they can use throughout their lives, like how to cook for themselves or how to sew on a button. It teaches excellent public speaking skills and employers are always impressed at how poised and talented the young

people are when applying for jobs," said Polly.

Eva, Doug and Anne have all been instrumental in community development in St. Peter's, Nova Scotia. They have seen evidence of the 4-H influence in their community where volunteering and co-operation are hallmarks of everyday living. There is a pride in community shared by all.

4-H has had a presence in St. Peter's for over 75 years. Doug has been a part of that program as a leader for 41 years. Anne has been a 4-H leader for 45 years and has watched her family grow up within the program. Currently, her son Stewart is the general leader of the Lakeside 4-H Club. Eva began her 4-H career as a young teacher. Until then, Eva had never heard of 4-H, but moved on to become the sewing leader.

"I have often been asked why I stayed with the program so long and why I never miss an opportunity to promote 4-H." "It is because in my 42 years as an educator and now 55 years as a 4-H leader, I have become convinced that there is no other youth program that does as much to develop character. It helps kids find their strengths and build upon them, thereby giving them a positive-self image developing a social consciousness at an early age and offers the tools to help them take an active role in society. meeting, how to speak in public and how to make decisions, as emphasized in judging,” said Eva who has been the recipient of the Canadian 4-H Council Volunteer Leader of the Year award and the Order of Canada.

In 1972, Anne, Doug and Eva were instrumental in the creation of Camp Rankin, the provincial 4-H camp, and as a result, they have been very involved in the yearly operation. Currently Anne is employed as assistant to the camp cook and Doug oversees the maintenance and repair of facilities at the camp.

These remarkable folks have spent a lifetime of demonstrating their dedication to youth and the desire to see each individual reach his or her potential. They plan on continuing their work with the 4-H program for years to come.

34th Annual Nova Scotia 4-H Show to be Held in Bible Hill

At this time of year, 4-H members are busy attending exhibitions with their 4-H projects and making preparations for the 34th Nova Scotia 4-H Show, September 30 - October 2, 2011. Hosted at the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition Grounds in Bible Hill, this annual event is an excellent opportunity for 4-H families and the general public to come together to view the many talents of 4-H members across the province.

Nova Scotia has the largest 4-H Show in Canada with all exhibitors - 4-H members from 9 - 21 years of age. Each year a county or region hosts the 4-H Show and for this year's show, the Eastern Region 4-H Leaders Councils (Pictou, Antigonish and Guysborough counties) have the responsibility of making site arrangements, providing security, fund raising and promotion.

“The Nova Scotia 4-H Show is an excellent family event and a great opportunity for the public to experience the 4-H youth leadership program in an interactive way. It offers something for everyone's tastes and visitors will see 4-H members demonstrate the livestock and life skills techniques they have learned throughout the year,” said Arthur Pick, Manager, Regional Services.

In a national survey by the Canadian 4-H Council and Ispos-Reid, 1097 4-H Alumni were polled for their attitudes towards the 4-H program and it's impact on them. Forty per cent named leadership and youth development as the most important goals of the 4-H program. Leadership development was listed as the most important goal. According to 52 per cent of alumni, it helps to create future leaders.

“4-H has had a huge positive influence on many aspects of my personal development and throughout my life. I will continue to be a product of the “Head, Heart, Hands and Health” motto. I've gained knowledge and confidence from my projects and experiences. I take pride in my club and community and have made many contacts and friends through 4-H. I've learned physical skills through working with my hands to build useful products. I'm sure the values and skills I've learned from 4-H will continue to guide me for the rest of my life,” said Tara McCarthy, 17 year old 4-H member, 4-Leaf Clover 4-H Club, Queens County.

The Nova Scotia 4-H Show is open to the public and admission is free. Competitions begin Friday, September 30 and end on Sunday, October 2.

Young Speakers For Agriculture Competition

4-H members interested in challenging their public speaking abilities and who want to discuss their enthusiasm for the agriculture industry, are encouraged to enter the Nova Scotia Young Speakers for Agriculture Competition. All senior 4-H members and alumni 16 - 24 years of age as of the competition date, can enter this competition on Friday, September 30, 2011 at 7 p.m. during the Nova Scotia 4-H Show at the Provincial Exhibition Grounds in Bible Hill.

The Nova Scotia 4-H member that wins the provincial contest will be sponsored by the 4-H Council to participate in the 27th annual Canadian Young Speakers of Agriculture National Senior Public Speaking Competition at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair in Toronto, Ontario on Saturday, November 5, 2011.

The rules are the same as those for the Royal competition. Each contestant will give a five to seven minute prepared speech, as well as introduce and thank another speaker. Contestants may choose to use a flip chart, or appropriate posters to illustrate their talk. Slides, films, videos or overhead projectors will not be allowed. A complete set of rules, as well as the score sheet, will be sent to all applicants prior to the Nova Scotia competition.



The competitors have five agriculturally related topics they can choose to speak:

- Dynamic careers in agriculture and agri-food beyond the farm gate.
- Does “value-added” really add to the bottom line.
- How the role of women in agriculture has changed in the past 50 years.
- The top five facts people should know about Canadian agriculture.
- Farm succession: Who is the next generation of Canadian farmers, and how will they succeed?

4-H members are taught public speaking skills during the year along with their project work and each spring 4-H clubs, counties and regions hold communications competitions. Many young people often identify the communications training and the confidence that it has given them as their most memorable experience in 4-H.

Do You Have the Proper Drivers License?

If you have a farm tractor trailer combination over 14,000 kg you need a Condition 23 Endorsement. If you are hauling any trailer (with a truck or tractor) that has a weight over 4500 kg you need a Condition 15 Endorsement on your license to legally drive on Nova Scotia roads. These regulations apply to class 5 license. If you are interested in obtaining these endorsements, contact us for information on the next opportunity coming up at the NSAC.

PROCESS For Condition 15:

1. Purchase a Road Test Receipt which costs \$47.68(HST Incl.) at an Access Nova Scotia Center or online at www.gov.ns.ca/snsmr/rmv/licence/

PROCESS: For Condition 23

1. Complete a Condition 23 application prior to testing
2. Have a Driver's Medical Exam completed by your doctor
3. Purchase a Road Test Receipt which costs \$46.85 (HST Incl.) at an Access Nova Scotia Center or online at www.gov.ns.ca/snsmr/rmv/licence/

You must register with the Central Office and have a valid drivers license ("N" removed) to be eligible for testing. The Condition 23 application, the form for the Medical Exam and more information is available by calling 893-3645 and speaking to Michael or Theresa.

County Updates

Inverness County has the largest member enrollment in the region this year. This county is known for being keen in the livestock area of 4-H - this year, the Dairy project is the county's strongest. 2011 also marked the second year Inverness County competed at the annual Horse Classic Competition at 4-H weekend, the County team placed second - an excellent showing! Kathryn Ryan from the Brook Village club, went on to place third in both Senior Public Speaking and the Hostess Competition. Jenna MacPhail, also from the Brook Village Club, placed third in Junior Thanking at 4-H Weekend.

Another event strongly contributed to by Inverness County is the annual EBI 4-H Showcase. This year, two members from Inverness County were selected to attend - Maggie MacDonell and Lauren van Zutphen. Both girls represented their County with Lauren being named the top overall dairy member in attendance, and Maggie placing fourth overall. Inverness County's Show dates are set for August 25 - 27.

Cape Breton County is second largest in enrollment this year. The county offers a variety of projects, especially homemaking projects - its strongest being the Photography project with an enrollment number of 17. Additionally, many diverse livestock projects are offered. This county is home to the oldest continuous club in Canada, the

Grand Mira 4-H club, first originating in 1929 as a boys Calf Club. Cape Breton County is a strong competitor in the speaking and demonstration competitions, both regionally and provincially. At this years 4-H weekend, Jacob MacDonald from the Rising Sun club placed second in Junior Introducing, Emma Simpson from the Northside club also placed second in the Intermediate Public Speaking competition, and Amber Lovell from the Northside Club took home top honors in Senior Single Demonstrations. Each year, the county hosts the “Junior Member Small Steps” workshop and provides craft co-op workshops to membership in the region. This county has also founded the “George MacNeil Scholarship” and are actively working towards making this endowment an educational funding source for 4-H youth to benefit from for years to come.
