Rabies

How to assess animal bites OR concerns about rabies exposure

Step 1. Treat wound and administer tetanus vaccination, if required.¹

Step 2. Assess risk for rabies exposure.


- Was patient exposed to mammal's saliva or central nervous system material via:
 - bite through skin?
 - mucous membranes?
 - non-intact skin?
- Did a bat land on or touch the patient?

If answer is YES to any one of these, go to **Step 3.**²

If answer is NO to both scenarios, no further action required.

Exposure to a mammal's blood, urine, feces, or a skunk's spray does not pose a risk of exposure to rabies.

Step 3. Assess action required.

If the patient is uncomfortable with contacting a pet owner, contact Public Health.

If there is uncertainty about direct contact with a bat, contact Public Health.
