

RESPIRATORY WATCH

Week 27 (July 03, 2022 to July 09, 2022)

In Summary...

Activity levels**

- Sporadic activity was reported in the Northern, Eastern, and Western Zone and no activity was reported in Central Zone during this reporting period.
- Influenza activity is lower in week 27 compared to the previous five reporting weeks.

Laboratory-confirmed cases*

- There were 8 new cases of Influenza A and 0 new cases of Influenza B were reported during this reporting period.
- There have been 381 laboratory confirmed cases of Influenza A and 6 laboratory confirmed cases of Influenza B reported during the 2021-2022 influenza season.
- There were also 1 Adenovirus, 7 Enterovirus/Rhinovirus, 6 Metapneumovirus, 2 Parainfluenza and 13 Respiratory Syncytial Virus cases identified during this reporting period.

Severity

- This reporting period, there were no cases hospitalized with Influenza.
- During the 2021-2022 influenza season there have been:,
 - 45 hospitalizations (non-ICU); mostly from influenza A (n=43)
 - 6 ICU admissions, all in adults aged 20+
 - 0 deaths*** of laboratory confirmed influenza

Syndromic surveillance

• The percentage of visits for influenza-like illness (ILI) was 1.3% during this reporting period. This is lower than the last reporting period.

Notes: *Reporting weeks run from Sunday to Saturday. The 2021-2022 influenza season is defined using PHAC's influenza surveillance weeks. This year runs from August 29, 2021 (Week 35) to August 27, 2022 (Week 34);

Figure 1: Number of laboratory confirmed influenza cases by report week, 2021-2022 season, Nova Scotia

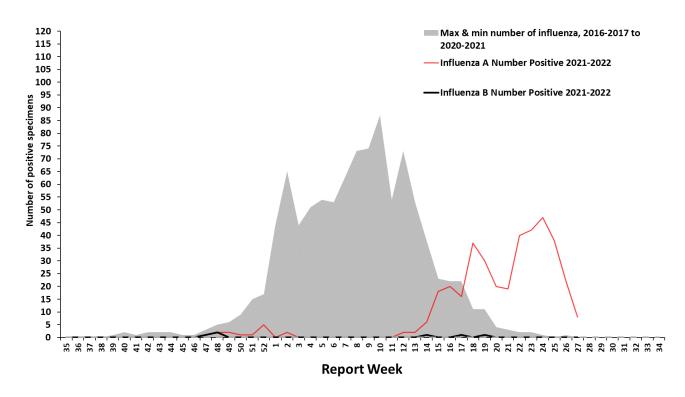

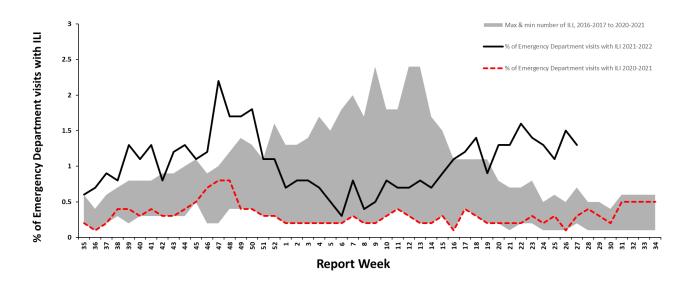

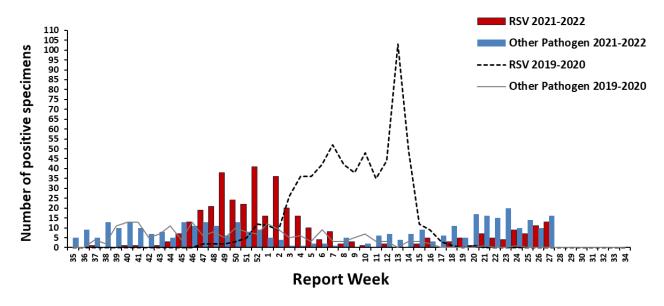

ILI CASE DEFINITION

Acute onset of respiratory illness with fever and cough and with one or more of the following – sore throat, arthralgia, myalgia or prostration which is likely due to influenza. In children under 5, gastrointestinal symptoms may also be present. In patients under 5 or 65 and older, fever may not be prominent.
