

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Off-Highway Vehicle Infrastructure Fund Summary Report 2019-2020 Department of Lands and Forestry September 2020

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## Introduction

The Off-highway Vehicle Infrastructure Fund (OHVIF) was established as a result of recommendations of the Voluntary Planning Task Force on Off-Highway Vehicles (OHV) in response to public concerns over the impact off-highway vehicle use in the Province. The fund is managed by Nova Scotia Department of Lands and Forestry and in part through the OHVIF Committee which reports to the Minister of Lands and Forestry (the Minister). Funds are distributed in the form of grants to the OHV trail user community, supporting the intent of the OHV ACT by developing and improving the usability, sustainability, and safety of riding opportunities in the province.

## Income

The Off-highway Vehicle Infrastructure Fund is a **Special Purpose Fund** as prescribed by the Province's *Finance Act*. Funds are collected by government from OHV users for a specific purpose. It consists of money acquired by agreement, gift, donation, bequest or contribution; income accruing to the fund; and penalties received by Her Majesty in the right of the Province pursuant to the *Off-Highway Vehicles Act*.

## Disbursements

The OHV Infrastructure Fund is managed in part through a Committee drawn from both non-government and government stakeholders and reports to the Minister of Lands and Forestry.

Funds are distributed in the form of grants to the OHV trail user community to support:

- Core Funding for recognized provincial off-highway vehicle organizations;
- Special Projects
- Safety Program
- ▶ Trails sustainable development and maintenance of OHV trails;
  - Emergency Funding
  - Small Projects
  - Infrastructure projects

Note: Monies allocated and not used, remain in the fund. Over the life of the fund, approximately \$400,000 has accumulated from yearly carry-over. Majority of this one-time allocation was directed to large projects such as bridges and other projects requiring a high percentage of capital outside the normal funding formula of the OHVIF.

# Core Funding

The recognized provincial OHV associations; Snowmobile Association of Nova Scotia (SANS), All-Terrain Vehicle Association of Nova Scotia (ATVANS), and Nova Scotia Off Road Riders Association (NSORRA) contribute by addressing injury prevention, creating riding opportunities and building organizational capacity. Core funding supports the operation and administration of those organization. Core funding decisions are the purview of the Minister and will be considered based upon advice from the OHV organizations and in consultation with Lands and Forestry staff and the OHVIF Committee. Recommendations respecting the disbursement of core funding among the three OHV organizations are made to the Minister of Lands and Forestry based upon advice from the Presidents and executive of the three OHV organizations.

# **Emergency Funding**

An annual emergency fund in is set aside each year to help groups cope with the expenses resulting from damage from blow down, washouts, infrastructure failure or other unforeseen conditions that occur outside the normal time frame for grant applications. In fiscal year 2019/20, there were three Emergency Funding applications approved for a grant.

## **Special Projects**

Special Project Funding is designed to address Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) related projects which are not eligible for funding through the existing infrastructure grant program. The project is to be non-trail related and not part of the organizations core operations. In fiscal year 2019/20, no special projects were funded.

# Safety related Projects

Safety Project Funding is designed to address Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) related projects which are not eligible for funding through the existing infrastructure grant program and promote OHV safety and training. In fiscal year 2019/20, no safety projects were funded.

# **Small Project Grants**

The small grant fund is a portion of the OHV Trails fund assigned to SANS and ATVANS to manage projects less than \$5,000. SANS and ATVANS were provided with an initial grant of \$50,000 – increased to \$75,000 in 2015. Currently the small grant fund allocates \$100,000 to both SANS and ATVANS which is topped up annually based upon reportable disbursements within the previous year.

#### Off-Highway Vehicle Infrastructure Fund -trail infrastructure projects

Historically, grants are distributed to projects based on project fit to the fund's goals and principles. Monies are awarded on a 50% contribution to overall value of the project and provided as a grant.

Over time, the Off-highway Vehicle Infrastructure Fund (OHVIF) has accumulated funds due to annual carryover. This provided the committee with a one-time opportunity to review projects outside the normal model of 50 percent funding to a maximum or \$50,000.00.

To be considered for funding outside the normal parameters, the project application must have illustrated:

- ► Lack of in-kind opportunities
- ► High over-all capital expenditures
- ► Lack of additional funding options

In fiscal year 2019/2020, thirty-eight trail projects where approved totaling \$1,217,058.84.
